- And finally, we are introducing an afternoon of free Board Games so come join in the fun!!






Recommended by Jane Archer

It tells the story of an aristocratic gentleman in 1922 who ran afoul of the Bolsheviks. He has been sentenced to house arrest in a grand hotel in Moscow. It's beautifully written, mixing the history of the time, with life in a hotel all sprinkled with humour and intrigue. Even worth a second read.

It's a fun read which follows the main character Frieda Zweig through her bumpy, sometimes funny, sometimes sad journey as she tries to find her place in life. Elvis is a beautifully made film by Baz Luhrmann who is not known for visual restraint. This is the story of an affluent family's day to day life contrasted with the dependence of their servants for their mundane lowly existence

I was so taken with the fashion of the day and how it changed as the years went by; the dresses, the hats, the shoes; the men's attire – their hunting clothes – how they all had to change for dinner. It was quite a big part of their lives – especially the women of course.

The home had a spectacular staircase and the most elaborate textured wallpaper. The furniture and decor were absolutely stunning. The series also showcased the first cars that they drove.

The servants are very much a part of the story; their living quarters are a stark contrast to the rooms they clean every day.

The characters are so well developed and the acting is extraordinary. Maggie Smith is at her best in the role of Dowager Countess of Grantham – the matriarch of the family.

I shall say no more and hope you have the opportunity to watch this series if that's 'your cup of tea'!
